Expression of interest (Attendees)

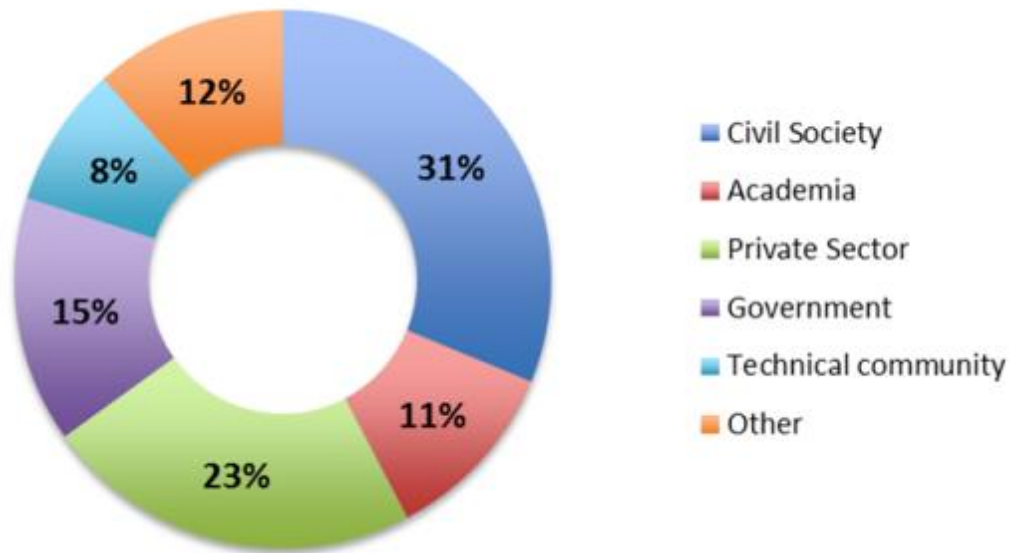
- All continents have all sectors represented, ensuring the multistakeholder proposal.
- It is worth noting that the Expression of Interest of Civil Society are stronger in Africa, while Private Sector is stronger in the Americas.



Participation up to April 15th

- Registrations: 681
- Countries: 87
- Groups:
 - Civil Society: 165
 - Private Sector: 121
 - Academia: 81
 - Technical Community: 91
 - Other: 52
 - Government: 171
 - 66 countries
 - 27 Ministers

Content contributions (Submissions)



- Total: **188** (**149** representing **46** countries; **39** representing documents signed by more than one country or region).
- **22** Governments submitted official contributions (plus European Commission and Commonwealth).
- All continents are represented



Content contributions (highlights)

- Preliminary data shows that the issue that was most frequently mentioned in the contributions were, in order:
 - ✓ security (86)
 - ✓ privacy (74)
 - ✓ freedom of expression (73)
 - ✓ globalization of IANA (55)
 - ✓ role of governments (52)
 - ✓ better developing country participation (42)
 - ✓ universal access (35)
 - ✓ strengthening IGF (29)
 - ✓ infrastructure intervention (29)
 - ✓ net neutrality (26)
- There were relatively few mentions of the other issues outlined above, namely:
 - ✓ new international agreements (16)
 - ✓ new organizations (10)
 - ✓ financial issues (13)
 - ✓ tax issues (6)
 - ✓ cyberpeace (7)

1. INTERNET GOVERNANCE PRINCIPLES

¶ 1 NETmundial identified a set of common principles and important values that may contribute for an inclusive, multistakeholder, effective, legitimate, and evolving Internet governance framework. 5

¶ 2 HUMAN RIGHTS 9

Human rights are central values and universal as reflected in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and that should underpin Internet governance principles. Rights that people have **offline** must also be protected **online**, in accordance with international human rights legal obligations, including the International Covenants on Civil and Political Rights and Economic, Social and Cultural Rights.
